

UNITED STATES Global leaders Approval





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





Harris starts her campaign for president improving on Biden's performance against Trump among some key group



A new CNN poll conducted by SSRS checked back in with registered voters who had previously participated in April or June CNN surveys on their current choice for president.



Methodology: The CNN poll was conducted by SSRS from July 22-23 among a random national sample of 1,631 registered voters who participated in CNN polls in April or June and were originally drawn from a probability-based panel. Surveys were conducted either online or by telephone with a live interviewer.

Results among the full sample have a margin of sampling error of ±3 percentage points. Results among subgroups have higher margins of error.

How a potential Trump winning coalition looks like? White non college (core) + Nonwhite gains






Black net margin contribution to Democratic presidential margin, 1976–2020





Key point:


Trump potential winning coalition is smaller but more solid

Harris potential winning coalition is wider but more fragile

Map Contested 2024: best case scenario for the Dem is 50/50




Ratings summary: House is going to be close...

Prediction Model:

If the elections were held today, % of winning probability would be:

Kamala Harris: 52%

Donald Trump: 48%

Race to the Whitehouse	44.5%	55.1%
JHK Forecasts	51.6%	47.6%
The Hill	46.0%	54.0%
Polymarket	52.0%	46.0%
538 (ABC)	53.5%	46.1%
Nate Silver	64.4%	35.3%

However, the elections are NOT today.

Key points moving forward:

- 1. Trump's ON or OFF message;
- 2. Kamala Harris campaign platform to be tested especially economic proposals-;
- 3. Economic indicators in SWING states
- 4. Turn-out estimates for Black voters in Georgia
- 5. Arabic-American voting intentions in Michigan (attention on Gaza situation)
- 6. Latino voting intentions distribution in Nevada and Arizona
- 7. Early (mail) voting numbers in Pennsylvania and Wisconsin
